



# Ink Girls by Marieke Nijkamp, illustrated by Sylvia Bi


An inspiring story about the power of a free press, filled with depictions of strong women and girls.

Alte Zachen / Old Things by Ziggy Hanaor, illustrated by Benjamin Phillips


A deceptively simple story about how history shapes the people we love.
